"Ordinary Object, Extraordinary Meanings"

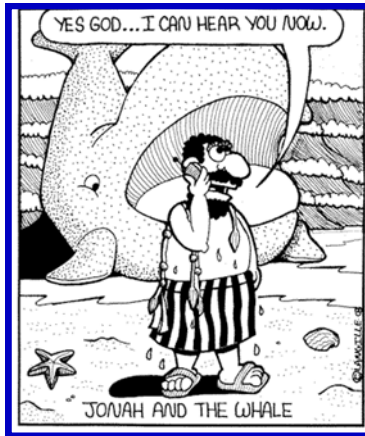

What did Jonah have to do with a tree? Wasn't he the one in the fish? Yes, and I wonder why God chose Jonah anyway! Jonah seemed to be an unhappy man. Surely there was someone who was willing to do God's will that wouldn't have caused so much grief to everyone. But God chooses those that can do the job. They may not be the best dressed or best educated people. It may be the gardener or the factory worker or the president of the bank. God can see possibilities in us that other people cannot see. God chooses us every day, but we sometimes rebel like Jonah. There is a lot more to the story of Jonah than the big fish.

Jonah was called by God to go to Nineveh to preach and save the people because Nineveh was in very bad shape

and God threatened to destroy everyone there. Jonah didn't like the people of Nineveh. He was an Israelite and the people of Nineveh were his enemies. He decided to leave town and go to Tarshish. After all, God wouldn't find him there.

God had plans for Jonah and God didn't give up. God caused a storm on the sea that threatened the people on the boat to Tarshish. Eventually they cast lots and threw Jonah overboard into the sea so they could travel safely. God was there also and saved him from the sea by providing a fish big enough for him to live in for three days until he realized he needed to do what God had asked in the first place! When Jonah was out of the fish, he went to Nineveh and preached to the people. They listened, even the king. One would have thought that Jonah would have been happy. He had been rescued by God by a big fish and then put on dry land. He did God's will and the people had repented and everything was great. God changed His mind and decided not to destroy the people. Jonah was still not happy. He still

disliked those people. He had done what God had told him to do but he had not done it in love. He didn't want the people of Nineveh to be saved from destruction. He wanted them destroyed.

While Jonah sat there sulking and watching to see what would happen to the people of Nineveh, God provided a shade tree to keep him out of the scorching sun. He was happy for the tree, but he wanted to see the people of Nineveh destroyed.

The next day, God sent a worm to bore a hole in the shade tree God had provided and it died. Now Jonah was angry again. God asked him why he was angry about the tree dying. Jonah replied "And I'm so angry I wish I were dead." Jonah 4:9

Jonah had a temper and didn't mind letting everyone know about it including God! God responded to him "You have been concerned about this plant, though you did not tend it or make it grow. It sprang up overnight and died overnight. And should I not have concern for the great city of Nineveh, in which there are more

than a hundred and twenty thousand people.” Jonah 4:10-11

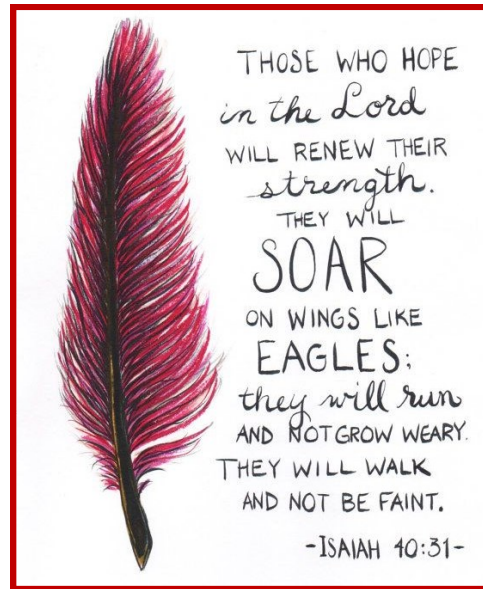

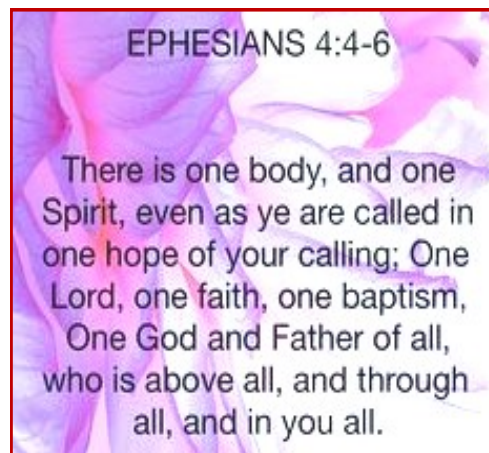
